



PEMNeT Training in Kiritimati – June 2025

TWO PERSPECTIVES, ONE GOAL - STRENGTHENING CARE IN KIRITIMATI

In June 2025, PSRH's PEMNeT programme returned to Kiritimati Island for the first time since 2017. Over the course of a week, the team worked with local clinicians to sharpen emergency obstetric and neonatal skills while also making practical changes to improve the clinical environment. In this issue, we share two perspectives on the visit — one highlighting the training experience, the other focusing on the systems and leadership changes that will help sustain the impact.

This initiative was supported by the New Zealand Medical Treatment Scheme, which is funded by the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade and coordinated by the Pasifika Medical Association Group (PMAG).



TRAINING HIGHLIGHTS - RETURN TO KIRITIMATI

Led by Dr. Rebecca Mitchell (Obstetrician, Australia) with midwifery and obstetric experts from Samoa and Tarawa, the team delivered hands-on, simulation-based training in managing maternal and neonatal emergencies. Over 14 clinicians participated in sessions covering postpartum haemorrhage, eclampsia, sepsis, shoulder dystocia, breech birth, and neonatal resuscitation. Wardbased drills reinforced real-time teamwork and communication using tools like ISBAR. Emergency boxes were set up, and local champions were identified to lead weekly drills and in-service education.



BUILDING SYSTEMS – LOCAL LEADERSHIP AND SUSTAINABLE CHANGE

The June 2025 PEMNeT visit to Kiritimati also marked a step forward in system improvement and local leadership. Working alongside clinicians, the team helped restructure the labour ward for better emergency access and co-developed a capacity- building plan with local leaders. Emergency boxes for PPH, eclampsia, and sepsis were assembled, and weekly emergency drills are now embedded into routine practice with ongoing remote support from Tarawa and abroad. Delivered in partnership with the Ministry of Health and supported by PMAG, this visit demonstrated how targeted clinical education can catalyse lasting change. A follow-up training in 2027 has been requested, with plans for a blended team of local and external faculty to meet both language and clinical needs.

Mauri! I'm Baaua from Kiribati. I graduated from the Kiribati School of Nursing in 1994 and hold postgraduate certificates in and midwifery. My work in outer island clinics like Tewai and Kabuna focused on Safe Motherhood ensuring safe pregnancies, deliveries, and quality care for women.

My goal is to improve access to care, promote age-appropriate sex education, and address barriers such as gender-based violence, stigma, and lack of confidentiality. I'm passionate about creating space for respectful, culturally grounded conversations that support informed choices.

Two key challenges are restrictions on family planning by some churches and cultural taboos around sex education. Working with church leaders to promote accepted methods like the Billings Ovulation Method is one approach. Sex education must also involve parents, teachers, and nurses to ensure it is relevant and culturally respectful.





Value the people around you and the cultures you work within. Building trust and working in harmony with communities strengthens our collective efforts in reproductive health. I look forward to connecting through PSRH virtual programs.

We recently launched an outreach program in Tarawa to improve access to emergency contraception. A free call line and dedicated transport service help women receive timely support and reduce unwanted pregnancies.

Pacific Society for Reproductive Health (PSRH), has been notified of an upcoming Asia Oceania Research Organisation on Genital Infections & Neoplasia (AOGIN) led regional study examining health care providers' attitudes toward anogenital HPV infection and related diseases. This research will look at how stigma and clinical practices influence HPV prevention and care.


Upon ethics approval, the PSRH network will be invited to participate via an online survey. Keep an eye out — your input will be vital in ensuring Pacific perspectives are captured.

Understanding and Addressing Attitudes Toward Anogenital HPV Infection and Its Related Diseases Among AOGIN Healthcare Providers.

Human papillomavirus (HPV) is a well-established etiological agent in the development of cervical cancer. Despite the availability of effective prophylactic vaccines and evidence-based screening strategies, cervical cancer continues to pose a major public health challenge globally. One of the barriers to the success of regional HPV prevention and screening programs is the social bias and discrimination associated with HPV infection.

Healthcare Providers play a vital role in counselling, promoting acceptance vaccine implementation of screening aims to assess relationship between Healthcare Providers' perceptions individuals with anogenital HPV infections and their practices across Asia and the Pacific. The study also investigates the influence of stigma on patient Healthcare Providers' knowledge levels, and their of recommending likelihood primary HPV DNA testing.

Data from the study will be collected through an online cross-sectional survey distributed via the Asia-Oceania Research Organization in Genital Infections and Neoplasia. Responses will be collected using the University of Malaya, REDCap platform, with informed e-consent obtained prior to participation.






The questionnaire consists of three components:

- (1) Demographic information, including age, gender, country of practice, specialty, and years of experience;
- **(2) Attitude measures,** assessing stigma and willingness to care for HPV-positive patients through Likert-scale items addressing empathy, discrimination, and perceived moral judgments; and
- (3) Knowledge and practices related to HPV, evaluating understanding of HPV transmission, vaccination, and screening practices, including use of HPV DNA testing.

Findings from this research are expected to inform targeted interventions to reduce stigma, improve HPV-related patient care, and enhance the role of Healthcare Providers in achieving goals in cervical cancer elimination.
