## **Executive Summary**

The Pacific Society for Reproductive Health (PSRH) is a charitable trust dedicated to improving the health and wellbeing of Pacific women, children, and families. Established in 1991, PSRH brings together clinicians, midwives, nurses, family planning providers, and public health professionals from across 17 Pacific Island countries to strengthen reproductive, maternal, newborn, and adolescent health services<sup>1</sup>.

This Strategic & Implementation Plan (2025–2030) sets out PSRH's priorities for the next five years. It reflects our commitment to equity, cultural safety, and patient-centred care, and aligns with regional and global health strategies for universal health coverage and resilient health systems.

PSRH's focus is on supporting and sustaining a skilled, connected, and compassionate workforce through education and training, policy advocacy, service strengthening, and collaboration with Ministries of Health, key regional development partners, academic institutions, donor agencies and communities. In doing so, PSRH fosters Pacific-led solutions that address workforce shortages, geographical isolation, and systemic challenges, while also building resilience in the face of climate-related and health system pressures.

This plan serves as a practical roadmap for members, partners, and donors. It highlights the values that guide our work, the principles that underpin our partnerships, and the strategic priorities that will drive action from 2025 to 2030. Above all, it affirms PSRH's role as a trusted regional network committed to advancing reproductive health for all Pacific peoples.
